

## Stephen S. Strick Bio

Stephen Strick is a New York and Los Angeles based arbitrator and mediator who has served on numerous international and domestic ADR matters since 1982, when he was appointed to the American Arbitration Association's Panel of Neutral Arbitrators. In addition to serving on the Independent Film and Television Alliance's International Panel of Neutral Arbitrators Stephen is a member of the ICDR's International Panel of Arbitrators and Mediators, AAA's Commercial Large Complex Case, Federal Communications Commission and Mediation panels, the CPR's Panel of Distinguished Neutrals, the International Chamber of Commerce Court of Arbitration, FedArb, and the United Kingdom's Chartered Institute of Arbitrators.

Prior to starting his ADR practice, Stephen was a film and television lawyer and studio executive at such companies as United Artists, HBO, and Dino DeLaurentis Corporation. He was in private practice and worked at the New York office of the firm n/k/a Loeb & Loeb. He has also worked extensively in ADR matters relating to Intellectual Property (patent, copyright, trademark), high technology, ICAAN disputes and the aerospace industries.

Mr. Strick was educated at Stanford University, The University of California's Hastings College of the Law and Pacifica Graduate Institute.

In addition to being a fellow of the College of Commercial Arbitrators and serving on its Board of Directors and Executive Committee, Stephen worked as the co-Chair of the College's Outreach Committee and on its International and Branding committees.

Stephen is a voting member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences' Executive Branch, a member of the Bar Association of the City of New York, The American Bar Association (ADR Section), and the International Chamber of Commerce Court of Arbitration (U.S. Council for International Business). Stephen is a member of the National Academy of Distinguished Neutrals.
